A NOTE FROM ALLAN

I hope everyone had a good week. With the days getting longer and warmer, its looking like springtime is getting closer. While we have not been able to see each other for six months, the parish too, is experiencing a springtime of its own! A number of parishioners are in the middle of organising 'Rosary Online' sessions which hopes to bring people together in the spirit of community and prayer. We understand that praying the Rosary can seem repetitious, and time-consuming. However, this form of prayer is rich in scriptural content and is a proven spiritual powerhouse. Here are some reasons why we should consider praying the rosary:

Trust in Mary's intercession – At the wedding feast at Cana, we read Mary's powerful intercession at work as she lets Jesus know the needs of others (Jn 2:3). Who better then to ask to pray for our intentions than the Mother of God (Lk 1:31; 1:35)?

A contemplation on the life of Jesus – The repetitious nature of the rosary leads us to a deeper contemplation on the joyful, luminous, sorrowful, and glorious events of Jesus' life.

Mary always leads us to Jesus – Mary's 'yes' (Lk 1:38) to be the mother of Jesus is the greatest example of Christian discipleship. Returning to the wedding feast at Cana, we see Mary telling the servants to "do whatever [Jesus] tells you" (Jn 2:5). She encourages us to do the same. We'll have more details in two weeks. Looking forward to seeing you in our first Rosary Online when we can catch up even for a short while and pray together.


