
COMBINED CATHOLIC RAFFLE 2024

First Reading Deuteronomy 4:1-2. 6-8

You may add nothing to the word which I speak to you – keep the commands of the Lord.

Moses said to the people: 'Now, Israel, take notice of the laws and customs that I teach you today, and observe them, that you may have life and may enter and take possession of the land that the Lord the God of your fathers is giving you. You must add nothing to what I command you, and take nothing from it, but keep the commandments of the Lord your God just as I lay them down for you. Keep them, observe them, and they will demonstrate to the peoples your wisdom and understanding. When they come to know of all these laws they will exclaim, "No other people is as wise and prudent as this great nation." And indeed, what great nation is there that has its gods so near as the Lord our God is to us whenever we call to him? And what great nation is there that has laws and customs to match this whole Law that I put before you today?'

Responsorial Psalm Ps 14:2-5. R. v.1

(R.) The just will live in the presence of the Lord.

- Lord, who shall dwell on your holy mountain?
 He who walks without fault; he who acts with justice and speaks the truth from his heart. (R.)
- He who does no wrong to his brother, who casts no slur on his neighbour, who holds the godless in disdain, but honours those who fear the Lord. (R.)
- He who keeps his pledge, come what may; who takes no interest on a loan and accepts no bribes against the innocent. Such a man will stand firm for ever. (R.)

Second Reading James 1:17-18, 21-22, 27

Be doers of the word.

It is all that is good, everything that is perfect, which is given us from above; it comes down from the Father of all light; with him there is no such thing as alteration, no shadow of a change. By his own choice he made us his children by the message of the truth so that we should be a sort of first-fruits of all that he had created.

Accept and submit to the word which has been planted in you and can save your souls. But you must do what the word tells you, and not just listen to it and deceive yourselves.

Pure, unspoilt religion, in the eyes of God our Father is this: coming to the help of orphans and

widows when they need it, and keeping oneself uncontaminated by the world.

Gospel Acclamation James 1:18

Alleluia, alleluia! The Father gave us birth by his message of truth, that we might be as the first fruits of his creation. Alleluia!

Gospel Mark 7:1-8. 14-15. 21-23

You forget the commandments of God and hold on to human tradition.

The Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered round Jesus, and they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with unclean hands, that is, without washing them. For the Pharisees, and the Jews in general, follow the tradition of the elders and never eat without washing their arms as far as the elbow; and on returning from the market place they never eat without first sprinkling themselves. There are also many other observances which have been handed down to them concerning the washing of cups and pots and bronze dishes. So these Pharisees and scribes asked him, 'Why do your disciples not respect the tradition of the elders but eat their food with unclean hands?' He answered, 'It was of you hypocrites that Isaiah so rightly prophesied in this passage of scripture:

This people honours me only with lip-service, while their hearts are far from me. The worship they offer me is worthless, the doctrines they teach are only human regulations.

You put aside the commandment of God to cling to human traditions.'

He called the people to him again and said, 'Listen to me, all of you, and understand. Nothing that goes into a man from outside can make him unclean; it is the things that come out of a man that make him unclean. For it is from within, from men's hearts, that evil intentions emerge: fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, malice, deceit, indecency, envy, slander, pride, folly. All these evil things come from within and make a man unclean.'

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REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate Holiness: Contagion not Quarantine

Many religious leaders have thought that some foods or some people are such a threat to the holiness of their followers that contact with 'unclean', 'defiling' foods or people must be avoided. Our Lord was totally opposed to the idea that holiness was something secured or gained by being quarantined or separated from any-thing or any-person.

On the contrary, he could touch a leper or have a meal with a prostitute. Rather than defilement flowing from the leper or prostitute to Jesus, his life flowed into them repairing their broken humanity, healing them bodymindspirit, holistically, making *them* holy.

The fact is that God, embodied in Jesus Christ, is contagious. The contagion of Divine Life is meant to flow into the inner depths of personality, into the heart. When this occurs, the Divine Life in the human person causes 'holiness'.

We have to strive to put ourselves in the way of this contagion. We become holy when we allow ourselves to be touched by our Lord Jesus Christ. How do we do this?

By hearing of His life in the Gospel, by being nourished by His life in Holy Communion, by being touched by the plight of those in whom He is to be found. St James in the second reading describes some who are particularly vulnerable in a patriarchal society with no social security system: the widows and orphans. No doubt, we can identify equivalent groups in our own society and overseas.

We could take a moment to pray that we might be more conscious of the Holy Spirit germinating something in our hearts, making us holy from the inside out, that our holiness be authenticated by good works so that we may be holy as the Lord our God is holy.

Here are the names for you to consider:

Bethlehem Parish

"Now after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of Herod the King, behold, wise men came from the east to worship him." Matt.2:1

Bethlehem is the birthplace of Jesus; it is also the birthplace of King David. It is a sacred place. The name Bethlehem means "House of Bread" and Jesus himself said, "I am the bread of Life." All the stories we have of Jesus come from Israel, and he began his life in Bethlehem. We recall this great event every year at Christmas. The Eucharist is what links us people of God. The bread and wine are the most important aspect of our gathering as community, at every church in our parish the community gathers around the table to share the bread, the body of Jesus. It is the bread, the Eucharist that links our four parish communities.

Damascus Parish

"There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is neither male nor female; for you are all one in Jesus Christ". Galatian 3: 28

Unity was the theme of St. Paul's letter to the community of believers at Galatia, reminding them that through Baptism, they were all equal in the eyes of God. We are four different communities, but all seeking unity through our faith.

St Paul, travelling by sea and road over 10,000 miles, was the church's greatest missionary, taking the small Jewish sect that Jesus left behind to become the largest Church in the world. It was on the road to Damascus that Paul saw the light and turned from persecutor to missionary. Damascus would be a suitable name for the Parish, bringing together all our communities on the road from Angelsea through Torquay to Grovedale. Paul was a man who journeyed and our Parish motto is "A vibrant community journeying with Jesus". If we were to take on the name Damascus Parish, we would be unique in that there is no other in this Archdiocese.

Emmanuel Parish

"A virgin will become pregnant and have a son, and he will be called Emmanuel, which means "God is with Us" Matt. 1:23

Emmanuel means "God is with us" In the first chapter of St Matthew's Gospel, he begins his Gospel by telling us that Mary will have a baby and it will be called Emmanuel, which means God is with us. We often reminded of this at Christmas. We like to think that God is always with us, in each of our communities and on our bulletin each week you will see our Parish motto, it says we are a vibrant community, journeying with Jesus. We take the Good News with us and share it with the world, knowing that Emmanuel, our God is always with us.

Galilee Parish

"Jesus went throughout Galilee, teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the Good News of the Kingdom, and healing every disease and sickness of the people." Matt. 4:23

Galilee is at the heart of so many of our Gospel stories about Jesus. It was at Galilee that Jesus walked on water, calmed the storm, called the fishermen, performed his first miracle, taught the crowds and healed the people. Galilee is mentioned 64 times in the New Testament. Jesus in fact lived in this area during his years of ministry. Galilee was where Jesus felt at home. It was so important to Jesus, and so it is so important to our story. Much of our Parish is by the water and we want our Parish to be a welcoming place, where everyone feels comfortable and wants to come to hear the stories of Jesus proclaiming the Kingdom.

St Joseph's Family Parish

"When Joseph and Mary had done everything required by the Law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee to their own town of Nazareth. And the child Jesus grew and became strong; he was filled with wisdom and the grace of God was on him." Luke 2: 39-40

Growing up, Jesus lived a very ordinary life in Nazareth with Mary and Joseph. Although we don't know how old Jesus was when Joseph died, we believe that Joseph was a good father in Jesus' early life and together they were a happy, loving family. Jesus' love for the poor, his respect for all people, his sense of social justice, his honesty, forgiveness, compassion all came from the role models of Mary and Joseph and other family members they might have shared their home with. Family was very important to Jesus and many of his parables have families in them. Although we have four Church communities and five schools, we like to see ourselves as one Parish family.
