Dear Parishioners,

I know the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord was last weekend, but I came across an interesting piece during the week that I thought I'd share. It's related to baptism because it is about water, the necessary element which the church uses to baptise. The article was from a fellow priest reflecting on the works of a philosopher and biologist regarding the world, seeking to show that the universe is certainly the work of intelligent design and not a random event of chance. Here are some of the amazing properties of something most of us understandably take for granted!

Most substances get denser and heavier as they get colder, but ice floats. If lakes, rivers, oceans froze from the bottom up, it would destroy the ecosystem. As it is, the ice barrier on top protects and insulates the life underneath from the extreme cold. Water can absorb a lot of heat without getting hot itself, making it a great coolant. The 326 quintillion gallons on the earth's surface stabilises the earth's temperature.

Water also does not compress easily. Even a mile under the ocean, water's volume only compresses by 1% and so even at incredible depths, it won't compress to a solid. It is also remarkable that water can exist in all three states (liquid, solid and gas) in naturally occurring atmospheric pressures. Water's viscosity and surface tension is just right to allow it run quickly down rivers and yet also be just abrasive enough to erode rocks. This, together with the ability of water to dissolve substances into it, means that water can carry the minerals from mountains a long way into lands allowing for soils, plants and animals to thrive.

Lastly is water's amazing relationship with the sun. Single-celled organisms, algae, in the sea are essential to life on earth. They turn sunlight into energy, so they need seawater to transmit sunlight. The sun emits an enormously wide spectrum of electromagnetic energy. It is so wide, that if a playing card represented one type, you would need a line of cards that stretches from earth to the Andromeda, the galaxy *beyond* the Milky Way. Sunlight represents just a few of those cards, but quite fortuitously, that makes up for 70% of the sun's energy! Seawater absorbs almost all of that vasty spectrum of energy, except for sunlight, which is allowed to pass through it. By enabling it to pass through, biological life is able to live in the sea and sustain the earth. It's quite mind blowing. For a theological interpretation on all that: Through the waters of baptism may the light of Christ penetrate our inmost being and give us life.

Today's gospel ends: 'He let his glory be seen.' Where? In a nondescript Galilean village at a wedding feast about to become a disaster for the couple. The wine is running out. A fiasco is impending. A hero was needed to step in and save the situation. Jesus and Mary are good candidates for hero status.

But, it is the servants who are the unsung heroes. They take a huge risk. They are going to look utterly stupid if they give the steward water to ladle out. Nevertheless, they follow the stranger's directions exactly and end up serving the best of wines, saving the couple from terrible embarrassment.

The Divine Glory is not going to enter people's lives with great pyrotechnics. Rather, when we do as Jesus requires, even if it looks ridiculous to the crowd, His healing and enhancing Presence can enter and save a situation of apparent disaster.

We could pause for a moment to pray for a certain naïve trust in the Lord as we follow his directions, so that Cana may enter someone's life, so that His glory may be seen.
